### The Thief at the End of the World: Rubber, Power, and the Seeds of Empire

Joe Jackson, five-time Pulitzer Prize nominee and the author of five non-fiction books and one novel, will discuss his most recent book.

The Thief at the End of the World is the gripping tale of how a nineteenth century would-be explorer, Henry Wickham, absconded -- literally -- with the seeds of Brazil's most valuable natural product. Jackson writes, "Henry's theft was no different than that by scores of others before him -- and yet, in a fundamental way, it was...Thirty-four years after Henry's theft, the British rubber grown in the Far East from Henry's seeds would flood the world market, collapsing the Amazon economy."

### Mark and Ruth Luckens International Prize in Jewish Thought, 2009

The University of Kentucky is pleased to sponsor the Mark and Ruth Luckens International Prize in Jewish Thought. The Luckens Prize, commemorating a generous gift by the late Dr. Mark M. Luckens to the University, is administered, judged, and awarded by faculty at the University of Kentucky. The Prize is awarded annually for an essay in the field of Jewish thought by a graduate student or recent PhD or someone of equivalent status.

General details of the competition are that the essay should be original and unpublished, and of around 5000 words. Essays are welcome in a variety of languages. The winner will receive a cash award of \$1000 and is expected to deliver a lecture based on the essay on campus during the Spring Semester 2009 for which travel and ground expenses shall be provided. The lecture should be given in English.

Essays are due no later than **November 1 2008**. The result of the competition will be announced no later than January 15 2009.

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### Summer Course Offering: Qualitative Methods and the Study of Civil War, University of Oslo

This course is about the application of qualitative methods to the study of civil war. It begins with an overview of the cutting edge in qualitative methods, intentionally casting its epistemological net broadly. We thus assess methods inspired by positivism (case studies, process tracing) and those more interpretative in nature (discourse analysis, ethnography, textual analysis) - the goal being to provide students with a robust set of tools for explaining and understanding the dynamics of civil war. The course also reviews the promise (and pitfalls) of methodological pluralism or so-called mixed methods.

The stage set, we then explore applications of qualitative and mixed methods to the study of civil war. Our focus is not so much what these studies say about civil war; rather, we assess their use of qualitative methods. What slippage occurs (and why) between the abstract methodological ideal and real world applications? What counts as good process tracing in the context of civil war? Why are interpretive qualitative methods - and the constructivist theorizing that inspires them - often absent in work on civil war? What are the special challenges of employing mixed methods, and can or should one mix methods across epistemological boundaries?

The course thus operates at two levels - data and epistemology. On the former, we explore the strengths and weaknesses of various qualitative methods, and how they shape and influence data collection in the special context of civil war. Epistemology brings us to the more foundational level of „how we come to know.“ How does one’s epistemological position influence methodological choice, and why might this matter for students of civil war? build upon other readings or discussions? For the problems you identify, how might you fix them?

### Call for Papers: Histories of Violence Graduate Conference at GMU – October 18, 2008

The conference organizing committee has chosen to extend the deadline for the fall Histories of Violence Graduate Conference at George Mason University to May 15. This conference will explore the ways in which violence is manifest in political, social and economic realms, and the various roles violence plays in the relation between these realms in any specific juncture, past or present. It will examine the ways in which violence is theorized, enacted, represented and obscured, and how we come to understand the role of historic violence in the construction of the contemporary cultural conjuncture, as well as how various histories influence the ways in which we relate to and theorize violence today.

The 2008 Graduate Cultural Studies Conference seeks to cultivate a conversation, among emerging scholars in Cultural Studies and related fields, about the centrality and ubiquity of violence. We are interested in papers written by graduate students which will help to articulate the ways in which violence is encountered in lived experience and in the literature, and which will point towards possibilities for approaching, conceptualizing, and mitigating violence through future scholarship and other activities.

General topic areas could include: theories of violence, sexual violence, terrorism, violence and/of representation, state violence, violence and law enforcement, nonviolence, violence and insurrection, violence and masculinity/femininity, racialized violence, divine violence, revolution, symbolic violence, etc.

- A focus on communication and content;
- An emphasis on developing meaningful content-focused language use outside traditional language classes;
- An approach to language use and cross-cultural skills as a means for the achievement of global intellectual synthesis, in which students learn to combine and interpret knowledge produced in other languages and in other cultures.

Within this large framework, CLAC can take many forms, depending on specific content and curricular goals within a discipline.

### Gender Ratios and Global Migrations, 1850-present: June 2008 University of Minnesota

Join an international team of researchers in reviewing and critiquing the preliminary research results of this exciting project.

The Immigration History Research Center and the Minnesota Population Center with funding from the University of Minnesota's Office of International Programs continues a research project on Gender Ratios and Global Migrations. Started in summer 2007 and using IPUMS and IPUMS International population data, an interdisciplinary research team of University of Minnesota and Vanderbilt University researchers have been exploring the timing and geography of transitions from male- to female dominated migrations within nations and worldwide.

Do women always dominate among short-distance migrants? Do we see transitions in gender ratios among both internal and international migrations and do they occur at the same times? How can perspectives from anthropology, geography, history, sociology, and political science refine and complement the research questions and quantitative research methods most often used in the study of population movements across time and space?

The conference will take place on Wednesday, June 11 (1-4 p.m.) and Thursday June 12 (9-12 p.m.) at the Minnesota Population Center 50 Willey Hall, West Bank Campus Minneapolis, MN.
