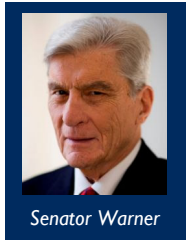

Waldo Family Lecture Series: Sen. John Warner

John W. Warner, U.S. senator from Virginia, will be the guest speaker for the Waldo Family Lecture Series on International Relations at Old Dominion University Thursday, Oct. 9, 2008 at 7:30 p.m. and will be held in the North Cafeteria of Webb University Center.



Senator Warner

Warner has won five consecutive elections to the U.S. Senate, beginning in 1978. In 2005, Senator Warner became the second-longest serving U.S. Senator from Virginia in the 218-year history of the Senate. Now serving in his 29th year, Warner is the former chairman, and now the second-ranking Republican, of the Senate Armed Services Committee. He also serves as the second-ranking Republican on two other committees, the Senate Intelligence Committee and the Senate Committee on the Environment and Public Works. In addition, he serves on the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs.

Warner began his association with the military more than 60 years ago when he enlisted in the Navy at the age of 17 during World War II. He later served in Korea as an officer in the Marine Corps. From 1969 to 1974, Senator Warner served first as undersecretary, then as secretary of the Navy, leading the Navy and the Marine Corps through the second half of the Vietnam War. Following his work as secretary of the Navy, he was appointed by President Ford to coordinate the celebration of the Bicentennial of the founding of the United States of America, directing the federal role at events in all fifty states and in 22 foreign countries.

The Waldo Family Lecture Series on International Relations, Old Dominion's first endowed lecture series, was established in 1985 to honor the memory of Loren Pierce Waldo Jr., William Joseph Waldo, Robert Hendren Waldo, Susan Waldo O'Hara, Julia Ann Waldo Campbell, and Harry Creekmur Waldo.

2009 Nuclear Scholars Initiative

The Nuclear Scholars Initiative, which is part of the Project on Nuclear Issues (PONI) at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, involves selected graduate students and young professionals in a six-month program that will enable them to dialogue with senior government officials and nuclear policy experts while conducting independent research. Over the course of the program, scholars will develop a nuclear strategy paper, which they will have the opportunity to present before a panel of experts and then publish in a journal produced by CSIS.

Created in 2002, PONI seeks to build and sustain a network of young nuclear professionals by offering a forum for interaction with accomplished members of the nuclear community and by providing opportunities for scholarly research and nuclear policy analysis.

Perhaps the most critical challenge in sustaining the US nuclear deterrent after the end of the Cold War is maintaining the human infrastructure to support US nuclear capabilities. Preserving human capital associated with the US nuclear deterrent is critical to sustaining these capabilities in a future that will continue to demand a strong nuclear presence in US national security. In light of these challenges, the Nuclear Scholars Initiative aims to build and sustain a network of young nuclear professionals by offering incentives and venues for interaction, scholarly research, and policy-relevant analysis.

Program participants attend day-long sessions every six weeks at CSIS in Washington, DC, where they will discuss a variety of nuclear issues with senior government officials and policy experts. Over the course of the program, scholars will prepare a research paper on Strategic Nuclear Force to be presented to a panel of distinguished nuclear professionals. Upon successful completion of their articles, the scholars shall receive an honorarium of \$500. The Initiative will pay travel costs for those participants living outside the Washington, DC area.

PEO Scholar Awards

P.E.O. (Philanthropic Educational Organization) was founded on January 21, 1869, by seven students at Iowa Wesleyan College in Mount Pleasant, Iowa. Today, P.E.O. has grown from that tiny membership of seven to almost a quarter of a million members in chapters throughout the U.S. and Canada, with headquarters in Des Moines, Iowa.

True to the mission of promoting educational opportunities for women, education continues to be the primary philanthropy of the P.E.O. Sisterhood.

P.E.O. Scholar Awards are one-time competitive, merit-based awards for women of the United States and Canada who are either pursuing a doctoral level degree or engaged in postgraduate study or research at an accredited college or university. In addition to recognizing and encouraging excellence in higher education, these awards provide partial support for study and research for women who will make significant contributions in their varied fields of endeavor. Priority is given to women who are well established in their programs, study or research.

The P.E.O. Scholar Awards are given once each year for the ensuing academic year. Each is a significant monetary award that will provide partial support for a year's study.

Nominations for the P.E.O. Scholar Awards are made only by local chapters. A woman is eligible for nomination by a local chapter if she: is a citizen of the United States or Canada at the time of nomination; has at least one academic year remaining from the date the awards are granted (August 1) to complete her doctoral program; is within two years of completing her doctoral level degree or postgraduate study or research; is a full-time student at an accredited college or university; demonstrates academic excellence, maturity and seriousness of purpose; and has clearly defined career objectives.

Issue Briefs for Model UN High School Conference

The ODU Model UN Society is starting preparations for our annual high school Model UN Conference (ODUMUNC), February 11-14, 2009. To help strengthen the quality of our work, Model UN is turning to GPIS for help with conference Issue Briefs. This is an opportunity to get involved with the university's model UN program.

The audience for Issue Briefs is the roughly 800 high school students and their social studies teachers who attend our high school conference in February. Issue Briefs are designed to introduce high school students to an issue and help them as they prepare as national diplomats in this UN simulation. In addition to the general outline below, Model UN Society has examples to follow and stand ready to help advise.

Standard Outline:

- Introduction: main elements of the issue.
- History or background.
- Key factors.
- Current situation.
- Role of the United Nations.
- Country positions: brief review of basic divisions.

Audience: High school students

Length: roughly 1500 to 2000 words.

Bibliography: important documents, useful articles, reports and websites (no more than one page).

Attribution: authorship of Issue Briefs will be acknowledged.

Possible topics include: International Security, International Law, Disarmament, Humanitarian and Public Health Issues, etc.

Mark and Ruth Luckens International Prize in Jewish Thought, 2009

The University of Kentucky is pleased to sponsor the Mark and Ruth Luckens International Prize in Jewish Thought. The Luckens Prize, commemorating a generous gift by the late Dr. Mark M. Luckens to the University, is administered, judged, and awarded by faculty at the University of Kentucky. The Prize is awarded annually for an essay in the field of Jewish thought by a graduate student or recent PhD or someone of equivalent status.

General details of the competition are that the essay should be original and unpublished, and of around 5000 words. Essays are welcome in a variety of languages. The winner will receive a cash award of \$1000 and is expected to deliver a lecture based on the essay on campus during the Spring Semester 2009 for which travel and ground expenses shall be provided. The lecture should be given in English.

Boren Fellowships provide up to \$30,000 to U.S. graduate students to add an important international and language component to their graduate education through specialization in area study, language study, or increased language proficiency. Boren Fellowships support study and research in areas of the world that are critical to U.S. interest, including Africa, Asia, Central & Eastern Europe, Eurasia, Latin American, and the Middle East. The countries of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand are excluded.

Fellowships enable both masters and doctoral level students representing a broad range of academic and professional disciplines to add a significant language and international dimension to their curricula. Boren Fellows study less commonly taught languages, including but not limited to Arabic, Chinese, Korean, Portugese, Russian and Swahili. Funding is available for both domestic and overseas support.

World Politics and Statecraft Fellowship

The Smith Richardson Foundation is pleased to announce a new annual grant competition to support Ph.D. dissertation research on American foreign policy, international relations, international security, strategic studies, area studies, and diplomatic and military history.

The fellowship's objective is to support the research and writing of policy-relevant dissertations through funding of fieldwork, archival research, and language training. In evaluating applications, the Foundation will accord reference to those projects that could directly inform U.S. policy debates and thinking, rather than dissertations that are principally focused on abstract theory or debates within a scholarly discipline.

The application, and all supporting materials (including the recommendation letter), must be submitted by **October 31, 2008**. Applicants will be notified of the Foundation's decision by January 30, 2009. The grant funds must be used during the 2009 calendar year and may not be deferred. Each grant will be paid directly to, and will be administered by, the academic institution at which the candidate is enrolled.
